# 6 Cicero 2021 MJ-HMP Jurisdictional Annual Report

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## Annual Reporting Year: 2021

**Background**: Cook County and participating municipalities in the county developed a hazard mitigation plan to reduce risk from all hazards by identifying resources, information, and strategies for risk reduction. The federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 requires state and local governments to develop hazard mitigation plans as a condition for federal disaster grant assistance. To prepare the plan, the participating partners organized resources, assessed risks from natural hazards within the county, developed planning goals and objectives, reviewed mitigation alternatives, and developed an action plan to address probable impacts from natural hazards. By completing this process, these jurisdictions maintained compliance with the Disaster Mitigation Act, achieving eligibility for mitigation grant funding opportunities afforded under the Robert T. Stafford Act.

**Purpose**: The purpose of this report is to provide an annual update on the implementation of the action plan identified in the Cook County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The objective is to ensure that there is a continuing and responsive planning process that will keep the Hazard Mitigation Plan dynamic and responsive to the needs and capabilities of the partner jurisdictions. #### **Hazard Analysis**

Hazards that represent a county-wide risk are addressed in the Risk Assessment section of the 2019 Cook County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update. This section only addresses the hazards and their associated impacts that are **relevant** and **unique** to the municipality.

Flood: Due to the Town's old sewer system, the community experiences flooding following heavy rain events. Of concern, is the need to separate the sewer and the stormwater drainage system and prevent hazardous materials from impacting the water supply. In 2013, High standing water was reported on southbound Interstate 55 at Pulaski Road.

Tornado: In 2016, FAA contract observer for Midway Airport spotted a land-spout tornado that formed on the lake breeze.

Severe Weather: In 2008, wind gusts were estimated at 65 mph.

Mitigation Success Stories: Examples of mitigation success stories include, but are not limited to: received a Grant, completed a major mitigation project, etc.

Fire Department Open House was held in October of 2021 - Demonstrated the need for fire and carbon monoxide detectors to the public by use of a burn trailer donated by the National Sprinkler Association. Took applications for and provided free combination/smoke detectors to Cicero Residents. Attendance by public estimated at 1500-2000 residents.

Personnel from the Police / Fire / Building / Sheltering Departments met and discussed the on going homeless population in Cicero. Identified organizations and shelters in the area. Relayed same information to EMS / PD personnel.

Future Needs: Examples of future needs include, but are not limited to: receiving training to better understand the mitigation grant application process, studies that may be needed to better understand hazards/risks, etc.

In the process of updating the current Town of Cicero Emergency Response Plan. When completed would like the plan reviewed and re-certification issued from the Cook County Emergency Management Agency.

When completed and certified, we would like to request assistance in performing a table top training exercise to familiarize all pertinent personnel with the Emergency Operations Plan and Coordination with County and State Emergency Management Agencies.
