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Annual Reporting Year: 2021

Background: Cook County and participating municipalities in the county developed a hazard mitigation plan to reduce risk from all hazards by identifying resources, information, and strategies for risk reduction. The federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 requires state and local governments to develop hazard mitigation plans as a condition for federal disaster grant assistance. To prepare the plan, the participating partners organized resources, assessed risks from natural hazards within the county, developed planning goals and objectives, reviewed mitigation alternatives, and developed an action plan to address probable impacts from natural hazards. By completing this process, these jurisdictions maintained compliance with the Disaster Mitigation Act, achieving eligibility for mitigation grant funding opportunities afforded under the Robert T. Stafford Act.

Purpose: The purpose of this report is to provide an annual update on the implementation of the action plan identified in the Cook County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The objective is to ensure that there is a continuing and responsive planning process that will keep the Hazard Mitigation Plan dynamic and responsive to the needs and capabilities of the partner jurisdictions. Hazard Analysis

Hazards that represent a county-wide risk are addressed in the Risk Assessment section of the 2019 Cook County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update. This section only addresses the hazards and their associated impacts that are **relevant** and **unique** to the municipality.

Flooding: There are risks to resident properties from flood damage. December 18, 2017 A Willow Springs family's home has flooded dozens of times in the past few years, and they blame the Illinois Tollway and a railroad with nearby property.

Severe Storms: Severe thunderstorms developed over northeast Illinois during the afternoon on October 2nd, 2006. These thunderstorms caused significant wind damage across parts of the Chicago Metro Area. A second line of thunderstorms formed across far northern Illinois during the evening hours of October 2nd, and moved south across eastern Illinois during the late evening and early morning hours of October 3rd. Wind damage was widespread across all areas the thunderstorms affected.
